ROMANS 3:23



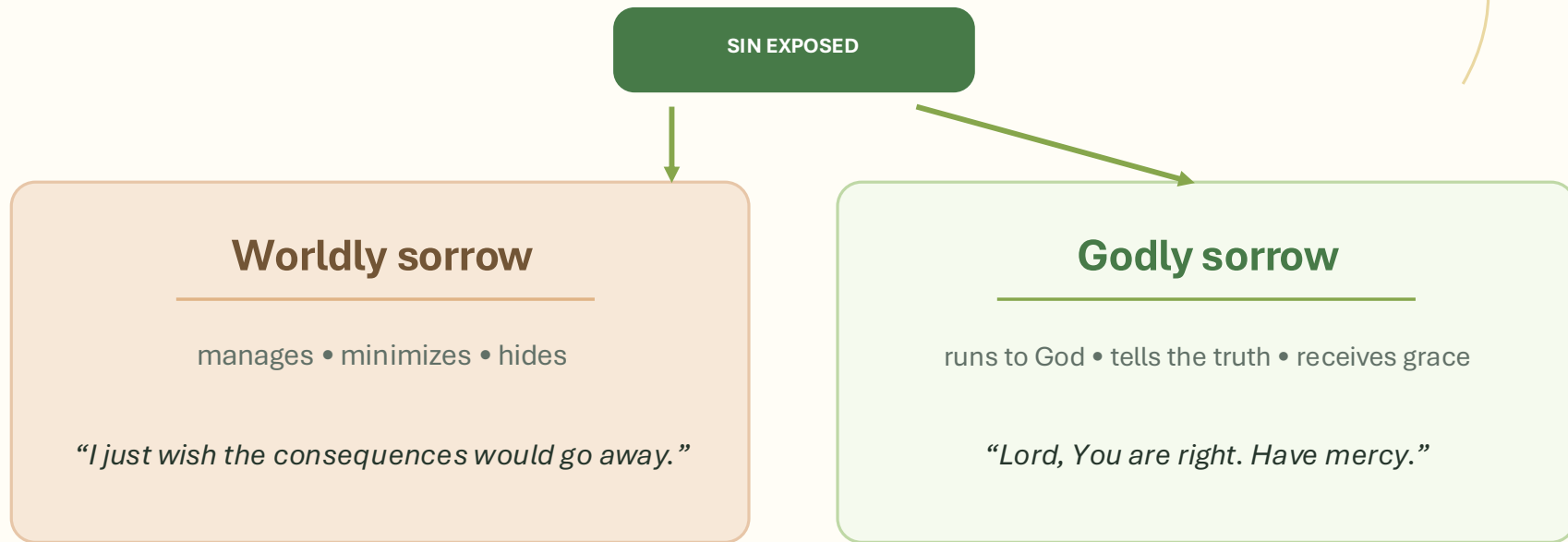
“All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.”

The story behind the Psalm

- David committed adultery with Bathsheba.
- To cover it up, he had Uriah killed.
- For about a year, he stayed buried under it.
- Then Nathan said: “You are the man.”

Two roads when sin is exposed

PATHOS

David feels the weight and shame of his sin - Psalm 51:1-5



*“Have mercy on me, O God... blot out my transgressions.
Wash me thoroughly... and cleanse me from my sin!”*

No excuse. No “let me explain.” Just mercy.



“For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me.”

Godly sorrow refuses to leave sin buried.



“Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight.”

Every lateral wrong is first a vertical wrong against God.



“Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me.”

David confesses not just an action - but a condition.

PROCESSING

The requests of a repentant heart - Psalm 51:6-15



“You delight in truth in the inward being... Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean.”

God goes after the secret heart - and makes the unclean clean.



“Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.”

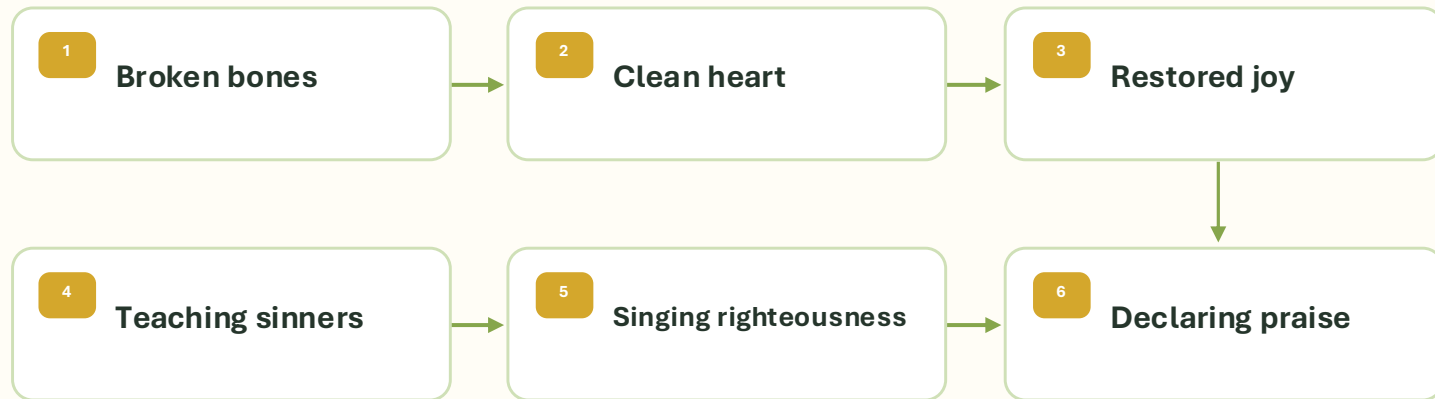
David does not just want forgiveness. He wants God.



“Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit.”

Repentance does not end in misery. It moves toward restored joy.

The shape of real repentance



Brokenness → cleansing → joy → mission → worship

The same God who broke him walked him, one honest request at a time, toward praise.



“Then I will teach transgressors your ways... my tongue will sing aloud... my mouth will declare your praise.”

Restored sinners become witnesses and worshipers.

POINTING TO CHRIST

Where Psalm 51 finds its “yes” - Psalm 51:16-19



“The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.”

Religious activity cannot substitute for real repentance.

Every cry finds its answer in Jesus

- Cleanse me.
- Wash me.
- Purge me.
- Create in me.
- Renew me. Restore me. Deliver me.

1 CORINTHIANS 5:7



“Christ, our Passover lamb, has been sacrificed.”

Justice and mercy do not compete at the cross. They meet.

Repentance reforms worship

- No more going through the motions.
- A right heart makes right sacrifices meaningful again.
- Grace does not make worship lighter - it makes it truer.
